**Course Description:** Portuguese 102 is the second part of a four-semester program in which students will develop basic communicative skills in Brazilian Portuguese. The goal of this introductory course is to help each student speak, read, write, and understand the language so that s/he can use it in real-world situations. During the

course of the semester, students will develop further knowledge about the geography and diversity of the Portuguese-speaking world. In order to ensure maximum contact with the language, <u>Portuguese will be used at all times in the classroom</u>.

### **Course Objectives:**

Upon completing this course you will be able to:

- engage in conversation, express your opinions, obtain information, describe and narrate in the past, and make comparisons through class discussions, role play, group/partner work;
- 2) present information to a listening or reading audience by participating in discussions, writing essays, and reacting to authentic texts;
- 3) comprehend and interpret written and spoken Portuguese on a variety of topics by discussing and reacting to (non)edited aural and written texts;
- 4) make comparisons between lusophone cultures and your own through the reading and discussion of authentic texts, videos, and participation in Brazil-themed activities that will be provided throughout the semester.

**ATTENDANCE POLICY:** Attendance is MANDATORY. If you miss up to SIX (6) classes and do not have an **official excuse** (i.e. a letter, memo, note written on WVU department letterhead that is signed by a WVU official such as a dean, sports coach or professor) your grade will not be affected. The official excuse is to be turned in to the instructor <u>on the day that you return from your absence</u>. For every unexcused absence incurred after the sixth one, TWO (2) points will be subtracted from your final grade. For example, if your final grade is 92% and you have missed 8 class meetings (8 missed, 6 w/no penalty  $\rightarrow$  2x2=4, 92-4=88), your final grade will be 88%. **2 late arrivals** to class will be counted as **1 unexcused absence**.

# **Course Requirements:**

PARTICIPATION and HOMEWORK: In order to actively participate in the class, it is necessary to read all assigned texts and to do <u>all homework indicated in the syllabus</u> <u>and/or any type of exercises/activities assigned by the instructor</u>. A student cannot succeed in a foreign language course without preparing for class activities. Since the majority of all class work is oral (e.g., commentaries on assigned topics, discussion of readings, etc.) these requirements are inextricably linked.

Participation includes, but is not limited to: 1) your presence in the classroom, 2) your willingness to respond to questions or to offer relevant opinions, 3) your contribution to pair and group activities, and 4) your general attitude toward your peers and the instructor.

\* <u>NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED</u> without an official excuse.

QUIZZES: Scheduled and unscheduled quizzes of approximately 10 minutes will be given throughout the semester. <u>NO MAKE-UP QUIZZES will be given</u>. The lowest grade that you receive will be dropped in the final tally of grades.

EXAMINATIONS (2): An examination will be given on <u>Friday, March 4</u>. You will have the entire class period to complete the exam. The second examination will be given during finals week on <u>Tuesday, May 3 from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.</u> This examination will be <u>cumulative</u>, although the majority of the test will be from the material covered after Mar. 4. <u>No make-up examinations will be given without an official excuse</u>.

WRITING, SPEAKING, and READING ASSIGNMENTS: These activities are described in the textbook and should be turned in or presented on the day indicated on the syllabus. <u>NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS OR PRESENTATIONS will be accepted without an</u> <u>official excuse</u>. Upon receiving the official excuse, the instructor will determine an alternate submission date for the assignment. **If the work is not submitted on the alternate date, you will receive a "0" for the assignment.** 

CULTURAL ACTIVITY: During the semester many cultural activities (e.g., Brazilian Portuguese Conversation Table or *bate-papo*, Brazilian film series, concerts) will be held. Attending these events and actively participating in them will reinforce your communicative abilities in Portuguese and will help you to increase your knowledge of lusophone cultures. Your active participation in the Department of World Languages, Litratures, and Linguistics' Spring Spectacular that will be held on <u>Wednesday, April 27</u> (with a mandatory rehearsal on Tuesday, April 26) will also be considered a cultural activity. At the end of the semester, submit your description(s) and personal reactions to the cultural event(s) that you attended. Your essay may be written in English or in Portuguese.

<u>All cultural activity essays must be turned in by **Friday, April 29**. No essays will be accepted after this date.</u>

ORAL INTERVIEW: During the last week of class, your instructor will conduct an interview with you that will last approximately 10 minutes. You will receive an interview guide so that you can prepare for this activity.
