Suggested Plan of Study Double Major in Spanish and Criminology

Students should always take the Spanish placement test and start at the level in which they place. Placing at the right level is crucial. This plan assumes the student places at SPAN 203, and thus can claim back 6 credits for SPAN 101 and 102. Students should self-place at SPAN 101 only if they have never taken any Spanish. Students starting at SPAN 101 should take 2 Spanish electives taught in English along with the 101 to 204 sequence during their first two years in order to be able to finish the Spanish major on time. Students may also consider study abroad and/or summer courses. Any transfer credit, dual enrollment credit, credit by exam, and AP credit will help reduce the number of courses needed per semester. Finishing a Double Major fulfills GEF 8.
